1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

GDC Memorial College was established in 2011. GDC Memorial College, Bahal is a premier institute in rural Haryana with both undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The college is NAAC-accredited with a grade "B" for Cycle 1 (2018) and affiliated with Ch. Bansi Lal University, Bhiwani. The college was awarded the fifth position in the "Best Swachh Campus Award" throughout India by the MHRD, Govt. of India, in 2018. The college was also awarded the "Best Green Campus Award" at the district level by the Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education (MGNCRE), Ministry of Education, India, in the session 2020–21.

Our commitment and dedication to providing holistic education have nurtured cohorts of young aspiring minds through academic as well as award-winning extension activities, transforming them into morally upright entrepreneurs, researchers, policymakers, and leaders in India.

The college has a team of forty-five well-qualified teachers to cater to the needs of the students. With well-equipped labs, facilities for different sports activities, and separate hostels for boys and girls, the college is working to provide quality-based education to students. The range of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, besides teaching, helps students with their all-round personality development. The college has a magnificent past, and efforts are being made for its bright future, therefore, every action is carefully planned to foster the composite cultural heritage of the region. The Institute offers six programmes at the postgraduate level: M.Sc. Physics, M.Sc. Geography, M.A. History, M.Com., M.Sc. Mathematics, and M.Sc. Chemistry, and seven programmes at the undergraduate level: B.A., B.Sc. Non-Medical, B.Sc. Medical, B.Sc. Computer Science, B.Com., BPES, and B.Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture. In addition, the college has an IGNOU study centre.

The congenial atmosphere and positive welfare measures help students from marginal groups as well. The college is working to provide the best possible knowledge, exposure to socio-political issues, an environment to develop critical thinking and analytical skills, a value-based system, ethics, continuous graduation in discipline, a health consciousness focussing on life skills, and easy access to education for all sections of society. No autonomy to incorporate changes in the syllabus.

Registration of the Alumni Body.

Need for initiating exchange programmes and collaborations with other universities and institutions, both at the national and international levels.

Encouraging students to participate in online programmes such as MOOCs, SWAYAM, and NPTEL.

Providing students of rural backgrounds with a platform to expand their skills so they could stand on their own.

Attending more FDPs, STTPs, and national and international level conferences.

Providing students with quality education to fulfill current job requirements.

Providing the students with the latest technology in the field of computers.

Providing an educational environment along with moral and social awareness so the students would become responsible citizens.

Educating the students about the use of renewable energy.

To enhance the number of MoUs and linkages for collaborative research, publications, seminars, symposia, workshops, and the exchange and sharing of resources at the national and international level.

Institutional Challenge

There are some challenges faced by the institution, which are listed below:

The college is in a rural area, so students are from a weaker section of the society.

There is huge competition with well-established, reputed autonomous institutions and several new institutions in the neighborhood.

The lack of a research-oriented culture is due to the lower number of PhD-holding faculty members.

Retention of good teaching faculty is one of the major challenges.

Lack of Roadway transport bus facilities.

Reduced admissions due to a lack of interest in PG courses.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

GDC Memorial College has contributed to the curriculum development of Chaudhary Bansi Lal University, Bhiwani, the affiliating university, by providing input based on feedback analysis from various sources and assessing local, national, and global needs. Many of the senior teachers are members of the boards of studies and the boards of examiners at Chaudhary Bansi Lal University, Bhiwani. Thrust on the development of knowledge and skills is provided through various programmes in the college, in addition to value-added courses and value-based education.

The college has a diverse range of course options catering to a diverse range of learners in terms of core options, elective options, and add-on courses that are self-financed at the UG and PG levels. Based on societal demands, the college has introduced postgraduate courses in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Geography, History, and Commerce after some years of starting college. The college has introduced market-demanding courses like BPES (Bachelor in Physical Education and Sports) and B.Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture is available in

only a few colleges in the state.

For timely completion of the syllabus, it is divided and executed every month. The institution also specifies certain initiatives for the effective delivery and transaction of the curriculum devised by the affiliating university.

A Choice-Based Credit System is introduced by the university for students, while a multi-disciplinary approach is followed in higher-semester classes. The semester system is followed as per the scheme of CBLU University. Several compulsory interdisciplinary subjects are introduced on topics like Environmental Science and Public Health, Human Rights and the Indian Constitution, Operations Research, etc. ICT is integrated into the curriculum by introducing compulsory subjects like Computer Fundamentals for all UG and PG courses. For Commerce students, Accounting Information Systems and Computer Business Applications like Skill Enhancement subjects are introduced by the university, and Communication Skills courses are introduced for PG courses as compulsory subjects.

Every department has prepared a question bank useful for examination purposes. Conventional teaching methods coupled with ICT teaching pedagogy are followed in the college. Assignments, student seminars, worksheets, field visits, industry visits, and invited lectures from industry and research institutions are organized for student-centered learning methods. For the faculty, some of the career-oriented programmes have been drawn from industry or research institutions. Several co-curricular activities and commemorative day celebrations, like International Women's Day, International Yoga Day, National Environment Day, AIDS Day, etc., are being conducted in the college to enrich students with a wide variety of co-curricular developments. Gender sensitization, environmental issues, moral and ethical values, better career options, and community orientation programmes are regularly conducted.

The institution has no direct role in the design and development of the curriculum, which is solely prepared by the affiliating university on its own, but the college officials and teachers communicate the ground situation to the university through different meetings at an informal level. The college has an effective mechanism for getting feedback from students so that corrective measures can be taken.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, learning, and evaluation:

To maintain transparency in its admission process, the institution provides information regarding its rules and regulations, number of seats, weightage criteria, reservations, etc. in its prospectus every academic year as per Govt. guidelines. Admission is provided on a merit basis, and all merit lists are made public through notice boards. To ensure diversity and inclusion, the institution provides reservations to students coming from the weaker sections of society as per government norms.

After admission, the faculty members check the learning level of the students through verbal and written tests so that the lecture delivery level can be ensured. Through regular class tests and different assignments, teachers evaluate the students's programmes.

The institution is committed to making teaching and learning more effective. To ensure it, the syllabus delivery is duly planned with equal spacing for timely coverage at the beginning of every academic session, and the execution of the same is maintained. The IQAC of the college determines the quality of teaching and learning through regular feedback from students and teachers. Different co-curricular activities like quiz contests, group

discussions, projects and assignments, painting, essay writing, slogan writing, etc. are conducted regularly to instill and evaluate the creativity and critical thinking of the students and to maintain their lifelong orientation toward learning.

To meet the academic needs of the students, the college intakes qualified and competent teaching faculty who, with their potential and commitment to teaching and learning, transform the lives of the students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovation, and Extension:

The institution is not a recognized research centre of the affiliating university or any other agency, but our teachers are involved in their respective research work. The institution encourages them to undertake such activities. Workshops and seminars are organized by the institution to orient the students as well as faculty members to research. The primary purpose of the institution is teaching and the overall development of the students. However, science exhibitions, quizzes and competitions, written assignments, field surveys, etc. are some of the means to motivate the students and create their research interest. Special seminars are conducted for PG courses as per the norms of the affiliating university.

Over the past five years, the institution has secured sponsorships from prestigious external funding agencies such as ICHR, SERB, the Ministry of Science and Technology, and the Indian Council for World Affairs, facilitating the advancement of research activities. Notably, GDC Memorial College has hosted 11 seminars and conferences, including events specifically dedicated to research methodology, IPR, and entrepreneurship. This concerted effort has resulted in remarkable scholarly output, with 133 faculty publications in UGC Care-listed journals and Scopus/Web of Science-indexed publications. Additionally, faculty members have contributed significantly to the academic landscape with the publication of two edited books, 11 book chapters in nationally and internationally published books, and 45 publications in conference proceedings.

In addition to its academic pursuits, GDC Memorial College actively engages in extension activities aimed at serving the community. These initiatives encompass a wide range of endeavours, including organizing blood donation camps, observing World No Tobacco Day, leading Swachhata Abhiyan and cleanliness drives, distributing warm clothing, conducting lectures on cybercrime awareness, promoting environmental awareness, and providing assistance in disaster management. The institution's commitment to social service has garnered recognition, as evidenced by numerous awards, including being honoured as one of the best Higher Education Institutions in District Bhiwani for its Swachhata activities and being awarded the title of District Green Champion.

In essence, GDC Memorial College exemplifies a comprehensive approach to education, intertwining academic excellence with a strong commitment to community engagement and social responsibility. Through its robust research endeavours, educational initiatives, and impactful extension activities, the institution continues to make significant contributions towards advancing knowledge and fostering positive societal change.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The college is committed to providing every necessary facility to its students to make learning more effective and groom their overall personalities. It has a good infrastructure with well-furnished classrooms, well-equipped labs, and other facilities. For learning resources, the college has a good library with several text and

reference books and books on general interest, along with many newspapers, magazines, and journals. It also has a well-developed IT structure. It provides the facility of ICT resources to staff and students and encourages them to utilize this facility for the utmost benefits in learning.

For effective maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, there are the Building Construction Committee and the General Purchase Committee working in the college.

Student Support and Progression

The college provides all the necessary information, like rules and regulations, admission details, number of sheets, reservation criteria, major activities, etc., to the students through the college prospectus published annually. The institution has facilitated the financial aid.

Financial assistance is provided to students coming from weak social and economic backgrounds through various scholarships and concessions. All female students are exempt from the tuition fee. It encourages equal opportunities by helping children with the potential for academic success avoid being restricted in their studies because of financial considerations. The book bank facility in the library and the subsidized bus pass facility are some of the other student welfare schemes adopted by the college. Students of the college are encouraged to participate in different co-curricular and extracurricular activities like quiz contests, group discussions, debates, sports, cultural activities, English communication skills, reasoning, technical knowledge, general knowledge, etc., which are organized throughout the academic session for their holistic development. To facilitate job orientation among the students and to make them aware of career opportunities, the Career and Placement Cell (CPC) of the college organizes various activities. CPC helps them understand the career options they have, and how to pursue them. Career counseling helps them understand their strengths and weaknesses in their present course or profession and lets them know what career they would be suited for.

Different cells and committees, like the Women Cell, the CPC, the Grievance Redressal Cell, and the IQAC, are working to address the academic, personal, career, and psychosocial issues of the students. These cells and committees facilitate student progression to a higher level of education and toward employment by providing proper guidance and counseling to the students. A list of students placed along with placement details as per the template, year-wise has been uploaded. The links or documents relating to placement cells, such as brochures, tie-ups, etc., are uploaded. Students are continuously inspired and motivated to participate in events like cultural, sports, art, etc. activities to enhance their creativity, artistic skills, leadership, team spirit, and sportsmanship. The number of awards and medals for outstanding performance in sports and cultural activities at the university, state, national, or international level during the last five years is summarised in the table as per the format of this criterion.

The IQAC of the college is effective in determining the quality of the efforts made by the college in different spheres. Regular feedback from students, teachers, and other stakeholders helps further improvement.

Governance, Leadership and Management

This criterion collects data on the institutional practices discussing its Governance, Leadership, and Management in the context of Perspective plans, Administrative Setup, Policies, Appointments, Service Rules, Performance Appraisal System, Faculty Career Development, Financial Management, and Quality Assurance.

To assess, assure, and maintain the quality of its plans and efforts, there is an effective mechanism in the college through which feedback from students, teachers, and other stakeholders is collected. A Performance Appraisal System is followed by the institution to ensure proper assessment of the professional competence of the faculty by collecting feedback and analyzing the responses. Several facilities are provided to the faculty to ensure their personal as well as professional development. Career growth opportunities are encouraged by providing incentives for the faculty to pursue them.

6.4 Mobilization and Utilization of Resources

Internal and External Audits are conducted by the institution at the end of every financial year to analyze the income and expenditure of the institution and ensure proper budgeting for the next year and optimal utilization of the funds based on the data collected. The institution has also developed strategies to allocate the budget for proper financial management with transparency.

6.5 Contribution of the IQAC

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the institution focuses on improving the overall quality and achieving academic excellence. To record the improvement in various activities, the IQAC periodically reviews the teaching and learning process, structures and methodologies of operations, and learning outcomes by conducting academic audits. It suggests and implements any changes required to ensure quality maintenance and improvement.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Best practices are those that add value to human life and support the main cause of an institution. It helps in the development of an institution—a source of means to perform social responsibility. It can change the lives of the whole institution as well as individual stakeholders. Colleges undertake different types of best practices as per their institutional environment; and try to bring about innovations and new ideas. Various events are celebrated in the form of national and international commemorative days, festivals, activities of NSS, NCC, student clubs, sports, cultural, and other such activities by bringing students and teachers with diverse backgrounds together on a single platform for creating an inclusive environment.

The NSS Cell of the institute regularly organizes cleanliness drives and tree plantation programmes on the college campus as well as in nearby villages every year.

The national or international conferences are organized every year by the institute. This practice promoted research activity in the streams of science, commerce, and the arts. It also facilitates research publications by faculty and students.

Faculty not only provides relevant online and offline resources to the students but also develops and delivers content whenever there are gaps in their understanding, in addition to regular classroom teaching and learning. The faculty of the college is constantly engaged in the creation of online content, including text material, instructional videos, and demonstrational videos, of the latest experiments, workshops, and remedial and tutorial sessions to help the students achieve their potential best.</p>

Skill development:</p>	<p>The institution offers various courses of the affiliating university under different programmes of study, such as hobby clubs that educate, sensitize, and help develop a positive, value-based mindset and attitude among students. The college also offers an environmental science course as part of the ability enhancement courses.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>The college has one of the multi-language departments affiliated with Ch. Bansi Lal University, Bhiwani, namely (i) Hindi and English, and these departments offer full programmes or courses in different programmes that deal with Indian languages, culture, and the knowledge system, amongst other topics. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

GDCMC is affiliated to CBLU, Bhiwani, and follows the curriculum formed as per the guidelines of UGC, approved by the BOS of the University. The college teaching faculty exhibits its active role and participation in curriculum design and development as representatives in Academic Bodies like Member, BOS, and Member, Academic Council of the University. The College receives regular updates of circulars from the university, regarding the changes or modifications in the curriculum. The Principal informs the concerned faculty about the changes.

At the beginning of the Academic year, the faculty members prepare their individual Academic and Teaching plans which are included in the Academic Calendar. The Timetable Committee headed by the Principal and a senior faculty member draws up a detailed timetable that efficiently deploys the units of time for academic and co-curricular purposes

The college has a semester system and is bound to complete the syllabi within a period of stipulated time so that the students can be prepared to face the University examinations without any pressure or delay. Being self-sufficient for all academic purposes, the college is committed to offering all the skill enhancement courses approved by the University according to the recently introduced Choice Based Credit System in the University.

GDCMC schedules all of its activities, including the performance of CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation), and adheres carefully to the calendar provided by the University. Every department then creates its calendar after the institute creates an institute-level calendar. Details like the overall number of working days and holidays, CIE dates, and dates for the Institute's flagship programmes are all included in the activities calendar for the Institute. Guest lectures, workshops, industrial tours, and other co-curricular and extracurricular activities are all on the department's agenda. Except for unforeseen situations, all activities academic, CIE, and otherwise are carried out by the schedule of events.

The academic calendars help faculty members to plan their respective course delivery. The CIE of students includes seminars, assignments, quizzes, and Internal Assessment (IA) examinations. According to the event calendar, the CIE is conducted according to a clearly defined process. Continuous evaluation and assessments are also done for laboratory courses, project work, seminars, and internships.

The academic committee meetings are a regular forum for the Principal to examine the status of the semester and make appropriate recommendations. If the university alters the academic calendar, the institute makes the required adjustments in accordance.

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Our institution integrates cross-cutting issues of society like moral values, human values, professional ethics, ethical values, gender equality, and environmental awareness, which are inseparable parts of our curriculum.

Gender Sensitization

The Women's Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell are available at the institution to offer counsel to students, advance gender equity among students, and address associated concerns regarding the safety and security of female students, staff, and professors. CCTV and high levels of security are used to protect the college site. To create a secure atmosphere for all the students, there are separate boys and girls hostels on campus.

Environment and Sustainability:

The first year of all UG courses includes a subject called "Environmental Studies" that focuses on ecosystems. This course was required by the university to educate students on the importance of protecting the environment. Environmental sensitivity is essential for both the preservation of the natural world and the continuation of human life. The main goal of this course is to educate pupils on the value of ecosystems for human existence. Along with STP, the college also has an integrated rainwater collection system. The wastewater is recycled for use in campus landscaping. Additionally, floor washing and cleaning are done with the STP water. A significant continuing tree-planting effort is in place. The days of national significance is observed by the college as Earth Day, Environment Day, and Ozone Day. To educate students on the effective use of natural resources, the college hosts workshops and seminars on environmental and ecological issues.

Human Values and Professional Ethics

The curriculum has focused on the development of human values and professional ethics through the following activities:

1. Scientific Methodology, General Knowledge, and Current Affairs: to nurture a scientific temper and be aware of contemporary developments.
2. Rural Development: to foster a fuller understanding of rural life to properly appreciate the politics and economy of our country and the social forces at work.
3. Agricultural Operations: to inculcate a spirit of working with one's own hands and develop an understanding of the contribution of rural life.
4. Social Service: to engender the spirit of brotherhood of man and to facilitate the establishment of a casteless and classless society.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

To enhance learning experiences, the faculty members adopt many methods, for example, the lecture method, interactive method, project and field work method, computer-assisted method, experiment method, etc. Teaching and learning activities are made effective by these practices. Many teachers use the conventional blackboard presentation methods, especially in mathematics, commerce, and economics, where they teach mathematics and statistics as numerical solving. Also, some teachers use PowerPoint presentations and computer-based materials.

The following activities are conducted by institutions to make the teaching-learning process more student-centric.

Experiential learning:

The experimental/laboratory method is used in science subjects to acquaint the students with the facts through direct experience individually. Students verify the facts and laws of the subject with the help of experiments. Especially the departments of chemistry, physics, botany, zoology, geography, and psychology use this method. Students take an interest in and learn things through experiential learning.

Project methods:

The project work stimulates students's interest in the subject and provides students with an opportunity for freedom of thought and the free exchange of different views. As per the requirements of the syllabus, the project work is done. For example, the projects are done in PG classes like M.Sc. Geography.

ICT-enabled teaching:

ICT-enabled teaching includes Wi-Fi-enabled classrooms with projectors, language labs, etc. The institution adopts modern pedagogy to enhance the teaching-learning process. The institution has the essential equipment to support the faculty and students. Especially, the PG Department adopts these services.

Interactive methods:

The faculty members make learning interactive with students by motivating student participation in group discussions, subject quizzes, news analysis, educational games, discussions, and questions and answers on current affairs, etc. Classroom discussions on various topics are done under features. Especially, NSS, the Ozone Club of the Geography Department, the Science Club of the Physics Department, and the Dharovar Club of the History Department have organized interactive methods many times.

Student Seminars:

The student seminars are organized by the concerned class teacher and department, where papers are presented by students on the concerned syllabus topics to enrich their learning experience.

Group Learning Method:

The group learning method is now being adopted through WhatsApp groups. Students share their notes and study material through this method. WhatsApp groups are made by a student or by a contract teacher. They share the information.

Black-board presentation:

In this method, each student is given a certain question. The student has to solve this problem on the blackboard. The Department of Mathematics is using this method.

Learning through Co-Curricular Activities:

The students participate in various co-curricular activities that support the teaching-learning process, like industrial visits, educational tours, district-level NSS camps, etc.

Learning through Extension Activities:

The students participate in extension activities like tree planting, blood donation, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, etc., and COVID-19 awareness programmes, etc. It helps students be responsible citizens.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

A transparent, time-bound, and efficient method is being followed at GDC Memorial College in terms of dealing with internal examination-related grievances. The institution has an efficient mechanism of internal and external assessment which is transparent in the conduct and also in the rectification of grievances. The grievances are solved with utmost priority in a time-bound manner. The institution strictly follows the guidelines of the affiliated university while conducting the internal assessment and end-semester examinations. Broadly, there are two assessments: (1) Comprehensive External Examination (CEE) and (2) Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). The CEE is controlled by the affiliated university. The role of the institution is to implement the directions from the University. The exam-related activities of CEE such as the preparation of question papers, exam supervision, answer-sheet evaluation, result declaration, etc. are carried out by the university. All information related to CEE is communicated in advance, and the same is communicated to the students accordingly. Various internal examinations are being performed throughout the semester. Some of them are the following:

Internal Assessments (Unit Test):

Immediately, after the unit test, the solution of the test along with the question-wise marking scheme is displayed to the student after the test to maintain transparency and uniformity in the assessment of the internal tests. The faculty evaluates the papers within a week of conducting the test. The evaluated answer sheets are shown to students in class, and faculty undertake individual grievances with a student on the paper if required by the student. At the end of the semester, the average marks of both unit tests are calculated and verified with the students. If any discrepancies are reported by the students, then they are resolved by the faculty immediately.

Assignments:

The faculty evaluates assignments based on the rubric, which is also shared with the students. The rubric consists of criteria such as timely submission, clarity, neatness, etc. The evaluated assignments are given

back to students, thus maintaining the transparency of the marks assigned and resolving any grievances.

Lab experiments:

The experiment performed in the lab by the student is immediately evaluated by the faculty, and the performance marks are assigned based on the lab rubric designed by the faculty. The lab rubric is given in the lab manual, which is shared with the students well in advance before the lab is conducted. The lab submissions are taken in the classroom, and the marks given by the faculty are available to the students immediately, providing a transparent way for students to reflect on their strengths and areas for improvement.

Blackboard Seminar:

Each student is given a certain topic from the syllabus by the teacher. The student has to present the topic on the blackboard. The PG department of the college is using this method of assessment regularly.

Program-specific outcomes (PSOs) are the specific skill requirements and accomplishments to be fulfilled by the students at the micro level and by the end of the program. The program coordinators prepare the PSOs, usually two to four in number, in consultation with course coordinators. The BOS of the affiliated university, including the Head of the Department and subject experts, of the individual departments, will discuss the same and approve it after endorsement by the principal.

Program outcomes (POs) are broad statements that describe the professional accomplishments that the program aims at, and these are to be attained by the students by the time they complete the program. POs incorporate many areas of inter-related knowledge, skills, and personality traits that are to be acquired by the students during their graduation.

Course outcomes (COs) are direct statements that describe the essential and enduring disciplinary knowledge, abilities that students should possess, and the depth of learning that is expected upon completion of a course. They are specified and communicated. The course outcomes are prepared by the course coordinator in consultation with concerned faculty members teaching the same course.

Response:

GDC Memorial College is affiliated with Chaudhary Bansi Lal University, Bhiwani, Haryana. The college offered undergraduate and postgraduate programmes and courses under the Faculty of Arts, Commerce, and Science. For these programs and courses, the institute followed the curriculum designed by an affiliated university. The Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution, and the same is communicated to the students formally through discussion in the classroom and on the departmental notice board.

After measuring the attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs, it has been observed that the strength of the students as well as the passing percentage of the students are increasing progressively. Besides, students' progression to higher studies, that is, from undergraduate to postgraduate, seems to be increasing consistently and rapidly in the last five years. Similarly, the ratio of students' placements is also increasing. We took the utmost care in measuring the level of attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs and followed formal as well as informal mechanisms for the measurement of attainment of the outcomes. Even so, we took feedback from all the stakeholders in this respect and tried to take the necessary steps accordingly.

Assessment is done through one or more than one processes, carried out by the department, that identify, collect, and prepare data to evaluate the achievement of course outcomes (COs) and programme outcomes (POs). The process for finding the attainment of Course outcomes and programme outcomes (POs) uses various tools/methods. Student's knowledge and skills are measured directly from their performance in the class/assignment test, internal assessment tests, assignments, semester examinations, seminars, laboratory assignments/practicals, mini projects etc. These methods provide a sampling of what students know and/or can do and provide strong evidence of student learning.

Subsequently, the college takes care of the attainment to measure the POs, PSOs, and COs and implements the mechanism as follows:

3. All the subject teachers prepared semester-wise evaluation reports.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Libraries at GDC Memorial College are integrated knowledge resource centres comprising a central library with 10084 books, a 2643-book bank, 4000 e-books, and an e-journal of 5000 covering all major fields of science, commerce, B.Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture, BPES, and arts (UG and PG). The two libraries cover an area of 2608 sq. ft. with a conference room and ample study space. Excellent resources are available for self-learning at the Libraries. The library has membership in the National Digital Library as well. The library has 105 student and teacher seating arrangements for study. It is automated using the Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), computerised with Delnet Open Source Integrated Software. It also has access to DELNET under institutional membership. The library is fully automated with Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS). Through the software, the library provides various services and facilities like OPAC (multiple searching), e-gate, circulation, stock verification, and the preparation of various reports. Users can search the library's online catalogue by author's name, title, subject, and other keywords within the campus through LAN. All the departments are provided with the OPAC facility to search for books, journals, and other reading materials available in the library. All the books, CDs, projects, back volumes, and SC Book Bank Scheme books are accessible with barcode

stickers for automatic scanning during the process of issue and return to the library for the stakeholders. All e-resources are accessible locally within the campus as well as remotely. The College Library building is centrally located, well laid out, and maintains the right atmosphere for learning. Library buildings have provisions for both individual and group studies. Adequate space is provided for browsing and relaxed reading. It subscribes to many journals of national and international repute, along with magazines and newspapers for general reading. The library also houses a rich reference collection, viz., Encyclopaedia Britannica, Encyclopaedia Americana, Specific Subject Encyclopaedias, Year Books, Atlases, and other reference material. Besides these, the library is also equipped with the latest e-journals by the UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium, accessible through a campus-wide LAN. The library also provides access to the Internet as well as CD- and DVD-based electronic resources. The library has an adequate number of terminals to facilitate searching for and accessing e-resources, web browsing, and other academic work. Provisions have also been made to allow the downloading and printing of material from these resources. Central Library offers various types of information services to its users, such as ‘Web-Based Current Awareness Services’, ‘Web OPAC’, ‘Newspaper Clippings, and Digital Library for Digital Collections Seminar and Conference Alerts. Reference/Bibliographical Services. Book Bank Scheme privileges for Reserved Category students (SC students). It has excellent ICT infrastructure with adequate bandwidth for fast and seamless access to the Internet. It is also a member of DELNET. Initiatives taken by the college include the following:

1. Free WI-FI, internet access, download, and printout facilities have been provided.
2. Reprographic facilities.
3. Organisation of Book Exhibitions/Display of New Books.
4. A proper system of feedback from users to improve library services.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

Response:

With the increasing demand for Internet access on educational campuses due to the evolving standard of education and flexibility offered by the Internet, universities, colleges, educational institutes, etc. are keenly stepping forward to set up secure and stable wired or Wi-Fi network campus for their students. As per the current market trend, most of the students like to carry 3–4 devices with them, like mobile phones, tablets, laptops, iPods, etc., to campus.

As these devices devour bandwidth, colleges and universities are struggling hard to keep up with the bandwidth demand. Educational campuses have major requirements for user access control, control over bandwidth consumption, and differentiated policy control for management and faculty’s access and students’s access. These campuses with wired and wireless internet access require a seamless roaming facility to access the internet from the classroom to the library to the labs and residential areas. Laying out a complete network with different vendor solutions would be a very costly effort and difficult to manage due to technical issues. Education institutes require a cost-efficient, comprehensive solution that offers all the advanced facilities and features on a single platform with a single point of contact for technical support.

We have provided Wi-Fi facilities to students at both hostels as well as on campus. The campus has 100 MBPS of high-speed internet facilities. The institute has a 24x7 Wi-Fi facility on the college campus for students and faculty members to avail of internet connections at any place in the college or hostel. The connectivity through a fully networked campus with state-of-the-art IT infrastructure, computing, and communication resources offers students the facilities of e-mail, net surfing, and up-and-down loading of web-based applications, besides helping them prepare projects and seminars.

There are different digital technological facilities available at the college. A well-equipped computer lab is also functioning at the college. The students at the college have access to the computer lab. The whole college building and the library building are fully facilitated by Wi-Fi connectivity. There is open access to Wi-Fi connectivity for all students and staff members of the college. All the departments of the college are provided with computers and other related accessories. All teaching staff members use ICT in the classrooms and laboratories, whenever needed. The different educational sites are shown to the students with the help of a digital device.

The institute has an Internet facility, and it provides its e-mail facility to staff and students. The institution provides free Wi-Fi facilities to the students. They can access the internet freely through their mobile phone, tablet, or laptop on the college campus. Staff are also provided with individual systems (laptop or desktop) with internet facilities.

Mission

To prepare worthy, sensible, and responsible citizens capable of transforming society and rebuilding the nation with the power of knowledge and the fragrance of education.

- To provide a flexible system, keeping in view the requirements and needs of students.
- To provide an eco-friendly educational environment and atmosphere for the overall intellectual development of students.
- To provide a didactic and value-based education to students.

- To generate and prepare educated and skilled manpower, keeping in view the market requirements for employment or jobs.

The empowered team of the college includes the principal, committee conveners, teaching and non-teaching staff, the student union, student representatives, stakeholders, and alumni. The principal monitors the administrative and academic processes by using administrative decentralization to allocate responsibilities to the department in charge and committee conveners to ensure the proper functioning of the policies, rules, and action plans of the college. A total of 44 committees work together to achieve the institution's objectives, including the IQAC, Discipline Committee, Cultural Committee, Library Committee, Sports Committee, NSS Cell, Career and Placement Cell, Red Cross, Women Cell, Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual Harassment Committee, etc. From the preparation of the academic calendar, tracking syllabus completion, conducting examinations, and maintaining discipline on campus, these committees successfully tackle all responsibilities. To ensure excellent academic performance, meetings with HoDs and faculty of various departments are conducted. The principal continuously monitors each room individually using CCTV installed for classroom activities, the movement of students in the corridor, and the college premises. The Finance Committee, headed by the principal, deals with the financial assistance received from various grants and other sources for the overall development and maintenance of the institution.

Response:

Administrative Setup

Being an affiliated college, the institution follows the rules and regulations decided by the affiliating university, i.e., CBLU, Bhiwani. The institution was established by the HKC Foundation in 2011. Institutional management has been designed following the top-down approach to management: all the duties and responsibilities are distributed through a hierarchical structure to ensure transparency and accountability at every stage. Institutional management has been categorized into two sections: **academics** and **administration**. At the top of the management is the governing body, which consists of the president, vice president, secretary, and other members representing each aspect of the management. All the members meet annually to discuss the functioning of the institution in the BoG meeting.

All academic as well as administrative management is done under the supervision of the principal. While the UG and PG Incharges monitor all the academic activities, the Administrative Office monitors all the administrative functions. Several committees have been constituted keeping in mind students' welfare and development along with the proper running of the institution; these committees include IQAC, Discipline Committee, Cultural Committee, Library Committee, Sports Committee, NSS Cell, Career and Placement Cell, Red Cross, Press & Media Committee, Hostel Committee, College Bus Committee, Timetable Committee, First-Aid Cell, Literary Committee, Women Cell, Anti-ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual Harassment Committee, etc. The principal assigns work to the conveners of different committees to ensure the desired results are achieved through teamwork. To mention a few, the discipline committee and anti-ragging cell ensure that proper discipline is maintained in the institution; IQAC works to ensure constant improvement in the quality of the overall management; and the admission cell ensures that all the university and DHE, Haryana, rules and regulations are followed and admissions are granted only to eligible candidates.

The organizational structure of the institution is given below.

Strategic Plan and Policies

The institution regularly monitors the plans and policies to be implemented. The principal and the UG and PG Incharges inspect the management of lectures by the teaching staff according to the timetable. In the absence of any faculty, a proper alternate arrangement of lectures is made. The academic and administrative activities include quality assurance activities, academic activities, administrative activities, extension activities, career guidance activities, grievance redressal activities, etc.

The various stages of teaching in any academic session include curriculum development (which is done by CBLU, Bhiwani, and the college follows the same), the preparation of an academic calendar, the creation of lesson plans, the preparation of an effective timetable, teaching, and learning, the organization of conferences, seminars, and examinations (conducted by CBLU at the end of each semester). Remedial classes are also arranged for the students requiring additional help. Suggestions are implemented at various levels according to feedback received from students and alumni.

Appointment, Service Rules, and Procedures

Being a self-financing institution, it follows all the service rules and procedures for recruitment and promotion of the teaching and non-teaching faculty as per the guidelines issued by the Department of Higher Education, the Government of Haryana, and the affiliating university, i.e., CBLU, Bhiwani.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The institution's appraisal system works on two types of performance-based evaluation: **PBAS** (Performance-Based Appraisal System) and **ACR** (Annual Confidential Report). The PBAS requires teaching faculty members to complete the prescribed self-appraisal format, which is then checked and verified by department heads, IQAC, and the Director. The appraisal report is based on the annual performance of the employee based on their academic, research, and other extracurricular activities. The format contains four sections. Part-A: General Instruction, Part-B: Academic Performance, Part-C: Other Related Information (duly signed by the principal), and Part-D: Comment on the Self-Assessment Management.

The ACR is filled with all the teaching and non-teaching employees. It has two parts; the first part is filled out by the employee, while the second part is the evaluation done by the principal. It comprises 32 parameters; each one of them is graded on a seven-point scale, i.e., Excellent, Very Good, Good, Highly Satisfactory, Satisfactory, Average, and Poor. The two reports are then sent to the management to proceed further with the annual assessment and appraisal. The objective of these reports is not only to objectively evaluate the performance as per established norms but also to identify potential aspects for improvement. On satisfactory performance, all employees are granted promotions and financial upgradation under the ACP (Assured Career Progression) Scheme.

Welfare Measures for Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff

The institution effectively implements several welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff. For their career advancement, the college arranges schemes such as Earned Leave Encashment, Maternity Leave, Medical Leave, Gratuity, Provident Fund to IV Class employees, Financial Support and Duty Leave for projects or conferences, Permission to Attend Orientation Programmes, and so on. The following benefits are given to teaching and non-teaching staff:

- Staff quarters with minimal maintenance costs and 24-hour power backup (100%) through solar power plants are provided to the residential staff on campus.

- Recreational centers have been established for the campus residents, and the institution celebrates all the festivals together.
- Free education is provided to the wards of the staff up to 10+2.
- A Wi-Fi facility is provided to the residential staff.
- A fraternity lunch is provided to the staff on the eve of the college's annual function.
- Recognition and awards of excellence for teaching, research, and extension are given to deserving staff on Teacher's Day.
- An incentive is given to the staff in the form of a salary hike for completing their Ph.D. degree.
- Transport is available for the staff at a reasonable cost.
- Indoor and outdoor games facilities are available on campus for the staff to recuperate after a hard-working day.
- Automation of attendance and leave is done using a biometric system.
- FDPs (faculty development programmes) and skill development courses are organized for the skill enhancement of the staff.
- Summer and winter vacations are given to the staff for their work-life balance.
- Other facilities include a fully equipped Gymnasium, Grocery Store (Tuck Shop), Dispensary, Canteen, and Shuttle Services.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Mobilization and Optimal Utilization of Funds

Being a self-finance institution, the college receives funds from the following sources:

- Fees collected from the students of self-financed streams.
- Various funds were received from funding agencies such as ICHR, DST, etc.
- Government Scholarships for SC and OBC Students.
- Renting of the college's infrastructure for conducting government exams.

The mobilization of funds relies on a centralized system in which the trust allocates a budget for the college every year. The entire process of regulating the financial process, preparing budgets, mobilizing resources, monitoring expenditures, maintaining accounts, and conducting internal verification and external audits is managed through a centralized channel for all the sister institutions running under the umbrella of the BRCM Education Society; this ensures optimal utilization of funds. The annual budget for the college is decided through internal and external audits.

Internal and External Audits

The institution conducts internal and external audits of all the financial transactions of the year to ensure financial compliance. The internal audit is conducted every six months by the Internal Financial Committee, which thoroughly verifies the income and expenditures; the compliance report is then submitted to the management through the principal. The external audit is conducted once a year by an external agency. The mechanisms put in place to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources are as follows:

Before the commencement of every financial year, the principal submits a budget proposal, considering the recommendations made by the heads of all the departments, to the management. For example, the Purchase Committee requests quotes from vendors for the purchase of equipment, computers, books, and so on. The budget is scrutinized and approved by the top management and the BoG (Board of Governors) based on parameters like pricing, quality, terms of service, etc. The expenses throughout the year are then monitored by the accounts department, including the depreciation costs of various things, to compare the allocated budget and expenses at the end of the financial year. The intervention of management is sought in cases where the expenditure exceeds the budget. The college budget includes recurring expenses such as salary, electricity, internet charges, maintenance costs, stationery, other consumable charges, etc., and non-recurring expenses such as lab equipment purchases, furniture, and other development expenses.

Internal Audit Procedure

All the vouchers are audited by the internal financial committee on a half-yearly basis. The expenses incurred by different heads of various departments are thoroughly checked by verifying the bills and

vouchers.

External Audit Procedure

The accounts are audited regularly by a chartered accountant as per government rules. The auditor ensures that all payments are duly authorized, and the report is submitted to management for review. Any queries occurring in the audit process are addressed immediately within the prescribed time limits. The institution has not come across any major audit objections during the preceding years. All these mechanisms exhibit transparency being maintained in financial matters and adherence to financial discipline to avoid defalcation of funds or properties of the institution at all levels.

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

Functions of IQAC

The IQAC is a major policy-making and implementing unit, an effective and efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism that works towards improving and maintaining the quality of education, identifying and suggesting new teaching aids, developing suitable infrastructure, and offering suggestions for new courses. It strives to maintain and enhance the quality of the institution and suggests quality enhancement measures to meet the growing needs of students. The IQAC at G.D.C. Memorial College was constituted on September 9, 2017, and since its inception, the cell has been performing the following tasks regularly:

- Improvement in the quality of teaching and research through regular input from all concerned based on feedback from students.
- Providing input for best practices in administration for efficient resource utilization and better services to students and staff.
- Reviewing the teaching-learning process, structures and methodologies of operations, and learning outcomes.
- Providing input for academic and administrative audits.

IQAC also ensures the following:

- Based on the academic calendar of the affiliating university, viz., CBLU, Bhiwani, the institute prepares its academic calendar well in advance before the session to ensure regular teaching and learning and to accommodate events like seminars, guest lectures, workshops, FDPs, hands-on series, etc.
- The teaching faculty prepares lesson plans for the subjects to be taught in the semester before the semester to enrich the curriculum with guest lectures, industrial visits, and internships.
- The teaching faculty prepares and submits lecture details, as well as the topics covered, to an online portal every day.
- A regular evaluation of the teaching faculty is done by students via feedback forms on teaching methodologies, course delivery, attitude, strengths and weaknesses, and difficulties faced in the subject. The principal and management also monitor the feedback system and take appropriate corrective actions.

IQAC Review Process

The IQAC meets every quarter to plan, direct, implement, and evaluate the teaching, research, and publication activities of the college. It carries out Academic Inspections to assess the quality of academics involving:

- Review of healthy academic practices.
- Mechanisms to identify and reform academic practices.
- Review of departmental facilities.
- Implementation of innovative methods in the departments.
- Self-development of faculty members.

It strategically plans and assigns the key responsibilities to sub-committees, which include Academic Results, Student Technical Training, Student Soft Skills Development, Placement Support, Faculty Development Programmes, and Research and Development. The sub-committees then implement the IQAC guidelines and report with their respective feedback. The students and staff give their feedback and suggestions on teaching and administrative performance through the Suggestion Box installed at the college, or through an email to the IQAC Coordinator at iqac@gdccollege.edu.in. Based on the feedback, various innovative activities and reforms have been introduced, including the introduction and implementation of the Student Mentorship Scheme.

IQAC also monitors student learning outcomes, ensuring the following:

- Semester System of Examination with mandatory 75% attendance.
- Maintaining an effective internal examination and evaluation system.
- Regular class tests and interactions.
- Timely redressed of students' grievances.
- Extra classes for weak students to solve their problems.
- Analysis of students' performance after semester result declaration.

7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1

Response:

Gender equality is the belief that men and women should be treated and perceived as equals in society in all areas such as education, employment, and decision-making positions. It is a fundamental human right and a necessary foundation for a peaceful, prosperous, and sustainable world. The institute has set all the standards for building a healthy environment. It observes high ethical standards in all its activities, specifically to empower and strengthen gender equity. The institute follows a "zero tolerance" policy against sexual harassment and gender bias at work. Various committees are formed for this purpose, such as the Women Cell, Grievance Cell, Counselling Cell, and Sexual Harassment Committee, to sensitize and equip students with issues concerning gender sensitization, women empowerment, and so on in the institute.

To promote gender equality and awareness among female students, female faculty, and staff members, the institute has been consistently organizing various interactions with experts. The issues addressed are maladjustment, academic performance anxiety, decision-making, underachievement, peer pressure, relationship handling, women's issues, absenteeism, malpractice, low self-esteem, emotional instability, etc. Awareness programmes and workshops emphasizing the rights of women, health, hygiene, and self-defense are also conducted. An ambulance is available on campus 24 hours a day, seven days a week to respond to medical emergencies. Physical workout facilities are provided for students in the girl's and boy's hostels separately. Safety and security on campus are ensured by the Proctor Committee, which installs CCTV cameras and provides round-the-clock security.

The institution celebrates remembrance days, events, and festivals through the Women Cell, Cultural Committee, and NSS Cell. The cultural activities are informal and intended to sensitize the academic world to other dimensions of human experience and knowledge. This would enrich students' lives by making them aware of their social responsibilities and the consequences of their actions.

National Nutrition Month was celebrated by the institute with all the female students and professors of the college. The institute takes numerous initiatives to provide an inclusive environment towards tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, socioeconomic, and other diversities. Committees are constituted session-wise to ensure an inclusive environment in the institute, for example, the cultural committee, sports, road safety club, grievance cell, NSS cell, Dharohar club, etc. The college makes continuous efforts to inculcate Indian values among the students, such as respect for parents, teachers, and elders and love for humanity, and to channel the heritage that our forefathers have bequeathed us. For promoting girl education and women empowerment, there is an active Women Cell and Career Placement Cell that helps the students appear in various competitive exams.

The NSS Cell conducts special camps in villages for NSS volunteers. These camps are directed towards various social issues impacting the lives of the people in the community by including social and cultural values among the young students. The volunteers mainly undertake awareness-generation activities about social issues. A seven-day camp was conducted in Paryavaran Bcchao Jivan Bacchao in Sorda village, Haryana.

The institute also organizes various cultural programmes to celebrate the cultural diversity of India, including Haryana Diwas, Hindi Diwas, Fresher, and Farewell Programs. Students from various regional and cultural backgrounds participate in such programmes and present their regional or cultural folk songs and dances.

All possible initiatives are taken by our institute in organizing various events and programmes to create awareness among students and staff to become responsible citizens of the country by sensitizing them to the constitution of the country. As responsible citizens of the country, the students are motivated to take part in various activities of the college. 7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

- 1. Among the two best practices, the first is to maintain the greenery and cleanliness of the institute by making it pollution-free.**

The effects of climate change are dramatically terrifying. In most colleges, the initiative for activities to make the planet safer comes from administration faculties. However, every student and essay writer can help to protect our planet by taking even small steps.

To achieve this goal, a committee is formed consisting of students and staff of the college to deal with waste management and cleanliness on campus. A sense of hygiene among students is promoted through cleanliness rallies, cleanliness drives, and plantations carried out by NSS Cell throughout the year.

The institute had successfully adopted and implemented the Swachta Action Plan in the campus.

For this, the institute was awarded the “**District Green Champion Certificate**” by MGNCRE, Ministry of Education, India, for the academic year 2020–21.

The NSS Cell of the institute regularly organizes cleanliness drives and tree plantation programmes on

the college campus as well as in nearby villages every year. A two-day NSS camp was organized by the NSS Unit under the convenership of Mr. Man Singh, NSS Programme Officer, on October 18 and 20, 2022. The theme for the camp was **“Plastic Mukh Avam Swachh Bharat Abhiyan.”** The camp included a cleanliness drive in Bahal by 100 NSS volunteers of the college under the **Swachh Bharat Abhiyan 2.0**. The volunteers attempted to make the surroundings of Bahal plastic-free and successfully collected two quintals of plastic and trash, which were then handed over to the gram panchayat of Sudhiwas to be disposed of properly. In continuation, the NSS Unit of the college also organized a seven-day special camp following **“Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsava”** from February 8th, 2022, to February 14th, 2022, with 45 volunteers under the convenership of Mr. Man Singh, NSS Programme Officer, at Village Patwan and college premises.

Creating eco-friendly rules on campus:

1. Planting trees at regular intervals and protecting the already existing plants.
2. Regular cleaning of the college and hostel campus by service staff and organizing cleanliness campaigns by NSS volunteers.
3. Separate dustbins for liquid and dry waste collection and proper dumping.
4. Green boxes for disposal of e-waste in the college.
5. Organizing rallies, poster-making and slogan-writing competitions, and extension lectures on environmental issues.
6. Under the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan the college organized a cleanliness drive in villages and in the college.
7. Transition from normal bulbs to power-conserving LED lighting.
8. Employment of sprinkler-based watering systems in its gardens and sports fields.
9. Proactive monitoring of lights and fans left switched on.
10. Minimizing the energy consumption through systematic monitoring.
11. Promotion of public transport and carpooling.
12. Ornamental plants in the pots are planted.
13. Civic sense is cultivated.
14. Lectures, essay competitions, seminars, workshops, poster making, and slogan competitions are held to raise awareness of the eco-friendly environment awareness to the students.
15. Whitewashing is regularly done.
16. NSS volunteers give SHRUM DAAN to level the ground and weed out the extras from plants.

b). The second best practice is to encourage research activities among faculty members and students by organizing national or international conferences every year at the institute.

This practice promotes research activity in the streams of science, commerce, and the arts. It also facilitates research publications by faculty and students.

The Department of Physics, of the institute successfully organized the “**International Conference on Advances in Basic Sciences (ICABS19)**” during February 7-9, 2019. The conference covered a wide range of topics in the fields of basic sciences like condensed matter and material science, mathematics, chemistry, etc. in the form of invited talks and contribution papers. In addition, there were talks by Young Achiever Award nominees and presentations of Ph.D. theses, as well as presentations of M.Sc. projects, also included in the conference.

The proceedings of ICABS19 were published by the AIP (American Institute of Physics) Conference Proceedings with a volume number, ISBN, and ISSN, and also registered with the Library of Congress. There were a total of nine technical sessions in which scientists, faculties, research scholars, and students (UG/PG) from institutes in different states of India as well as from abroad participated. In this conference, a total of 520 research papers were received.

Another national-level seminar was organized by the Department of History with the sponsorship of the ICHR (Indian Council of Historical Research, New Delhi) on the topic “**????????? ??? ??????? ?????? ?? ?????????: ?????????? ??? ???? ?????????????? ??????- 1803-1947** ” under the convenership of Shri Ashok, AP of History during 03-04 December, 2021. Prof. R. K. Mittal, Vice-Chancellor, presided over the function as a Chief Guest, along with Dr. Surender Sharma, Vice-Chairman, as Guest of Honour, and Dr. Rajesh Kumar, Director, ICHR, New Delhi, who shared his views as Key Note Speaker of the Inaugural Day of the Seminar.

A two-day National Conference on “**Natural Resources Sustainability and Geospatial Technology**” sponsored by **SERB, Department of Science & Technology, Govt. of India, New Delhi**, was organized by the Geography Department of the institute from April 21 to April 22. More than 200 research papers were presented by scholars, researchers, and scientists from 21 different universities in seven states in a total of four technical sessions. The chief guests for the inaugural ceremony were Prof. Rajender Kumar Anayath, Hon’ble Vice Chancellor, Deenbandhu Chhotu Ram University of Science & Technology, Murthal, and Dr. Pravin Kumar, Director Technical, Mission for Clean Ganga, Ministry of Jal Shakti, Govt. of India, New Delhi. In this way, conferences are organized from time to time by the institute.

Besides this, the college has also started two new courses: a four-year B.Sc. Agriculture (Hons.) course and a BPES course in physical education. Every year, a large number of rural students (girls and boys) are admitted to the different courses offered by the college, and the college makes sure to provide all the basic need-based facilities to students as per the direction of the university. It is also about learning to interact with other people, and being aware of social, environmental, and gender issues, and inequities in society. We provide an opportunity for every student to contribute to making the society, in which they live a better place and to grow as better individuals. As a special thrust, societal development is also instilled on a large scale in the students through the active NSS unit, the Road Safety Club, and the Dharohar Club, which undertakes various services to inculcate social values. A poster-making competition was organized on the theme "Tobacco Free India" on World No-Tobacco Day to encourage the students to spread awareness to the masses regarding the life-threatening diseases caused by tobacco consumption and addiction.
